Keeping the Ember Days of Advent on December 15th, 17th, and 18th this year by observing the ancient fast of partial abstinence on the Wednesday and Saturday and full abstinence on the Friday. Full abstinence is refraining from all meat including in soups and gravy's, while partial abstinence means that meat or meat broths in soups or gravy's may be eaten at the principle meal.

Two additional optional fast day are December 7th (the Vigil of the Immaculate Conception) and December 24th (Vigil of the Nativity of Our Lord). Please note, in the Eastern Rite, fasting all through Advent begins on November 11th and some Roman Rite Catholics will also fast and abstain during either Advent or the full 40-days prior to Christmas.

Another apparition of confused lineage is Our Lady of All Nations in Amsterdam which the Vatican said in the 1970s was not a true apparition, was approved in the 2000s, and just this year has had local approval rescinded.

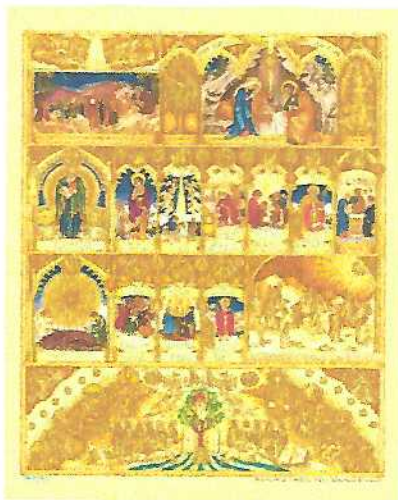
The new liturgical year begins on November 28th with the First Sunday of Advent.

WHERE IN THE DOUAY?

In honor of the Holy Family:

And it came to pass, that in those days there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus, that the whole world should be enrolled. This enrolling was first made by Cyrinus, the governor of Syria. And all went to be enrolled, every one into his own city. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, out of the city of Nazareth into Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem: because he was of the house and family of David, to be enrolled with Mary his espoused wife, who was with child. And it came to pass, that when they were there, her days were accomplished, that she should be delivered. And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him up in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the inn.

A commentary on verse 7 comes to us from the Rev. Fr. Geo. Leo Haydock:

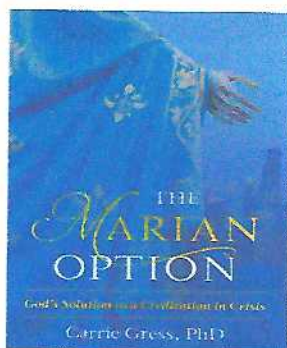
Ver. 7 *In a manger* within a stable, or place where beasts were sheltered. And it is the common opinion that an ox and an ass were there at that time. See Baronius, Tillemont, &c. Wi.—O wonderful mystery! O astonishing condescension of a God-man! From His birth He takes upon Himself poverty. Had such been His pleasure, Christ might, at His birth, have shaken the heavens by His power, and terrified all nature by His majesty. But these were not the attendants of His coming; for He came not to destroy, but to save; not to display riches, but to teach us a contempt of human grandeur. He therefore condescended not only to become man, but even *the vilest of men*. *Metaphrastes*.

BOOK REVIEW



The Marian Option: God's Solution to a Civilization in Crisis by Carrie Gress

This book is amazing! It's not the work of a saint or divine revelation but a work by a mother of four and professor of many more. *The Marian Option's* great merit lies in the fact that Dr. Gress has pulled together 2000 years of knowledge of and writings about the Blessed Mother and extracted the bits most pertinent to her argument that the stronger our devotion to Mary, the closer our attachment to following her example of true devotion, the happier we will be individually and as a society.

This book is a gateway, a stepping-stone to some of the best writings produced about Our Lady. If dubious of this glowing claim, read chapter two first to see how Dr. Gress traced Our Lady's intervention in human affairs when God willed for conversion or willed because of the fervor of faith of those who prayed for her assistance.

A few examples of just what kind of information Dr. Gress has pulled together:

The British, who had been counting on advancing under the cover of fog, were exposed and routed when the mist unexpectedly lifted at the very moment the Mass was offered [during the Battle of New Orleans].

"He[Josef Hayden] held onto his sacred beads [the Rosary] when he wrote his celebrated *Stabat Mater*."

Thanks to Mary, we are gratified with a quasi-physical portrait of the Paraclete and a more specific and concrete understanding of his mysterious ways.

During the Second World War, [Fr.] Flanagan was in the navy and part of the demolition crew charged with clearing the bombs on Omaha Beach on D-Day. Out of one hundred men in his unit – most of whom simply detonated the bombs with their bodies because there wasn't time to detonate them properly – only three survived. Father Flanagan recalled seeing Our Lady wrap her mantle around him to protect him from the bombs exploding nearby.

CHURCH SYMBOLISM

"Twelve Days of Christmas"

As everyone prepares to dust off their vocal chords and chortle their way through Christmas carol sing-alongs on the radio, here in an easy place to refer back to for the Catholic meaning behind this popular English Christmas carol. You have probably heard before that the song is actually code for teaching children Catechism during the period when Catholicism was outlawed in England. To read about the heroic priests of this period, you might want to start with Evelyn Waugh's *Edmund Campion: A Life*, but there are other books about these – frequently – martyr priests.

"Good Queen Bess" was a radical Protestant who hated the Catholic religion. Catholicism was outlawed during her reign even though some

historians claim she was a moderate – she started out being “tolerate” and only became worse as her reign continued, this is fact. Her reign started in 1558, the same year that Catholicism was outlawed. Catholics had to go underground, being outwardly either Protestant or non-religious. The wealthy and noble were able to keep their true religion a secret by building the famous ‘priest holes’ to hide traveling priests, and frequently they hired Catholics to work in their homes or on their grounds. The networks were known to the Catholics and finding these priest holes today shows just how many noble or wealthy families remained Catholics, at least for a time. Consequently, these homes became enclaves. If discovered, exposed, or ratted out, it was common for the priests to be killed. The landowners would be stripped of their land and holdings at best and killed (being drawn and quartered gets mentioned a lot) at worst.

In a Scottish 1594 rebellion against the king, the 9th Earl of Erroll, Francis Hay, fought against the Protestants under the 1st Marquess of Huntly, George Gordon. They won the Battle of Glenlivet against the Presbyterian Earl of Argyll, and in retaliation, Presbyterian King James IV ordered both Huntly and Erroll’s castles destroyed.¹ They were fortunate that their act of treason, incited on religious grounds, did not cost them their heads.

The locations of two of the last holdouts before apostatizing in the U.K., in the 18th century, were some of the members of Clan Hay in Aberdeenshire (Lowlands) and several of the Highland clans (the MacDonald’s get recognition here – I read a few years ago this may have been one factor in the London-ordered Glencoe Massacre in 1692). Part of the reason the English retribution against the Highlanders after Culloden in 1745 was so severe was not only for their support of Bonnie Prince Charlie (Catholic grandson of King James VII/II), but because it was known some of these clansmen were still Catholic.

In 1829, Parliament finally passed a law emancipating Catholics, which allowed them to not only practice their religion in the open, but they were no longer criminals and were fully restored to citizenship, which included the option of running

for political office. How many fully English or Scottish Catholics were left, I’ve never actually tracked down, but my understanding is, the Irish Catholics were the primary focus of this emancipation since they were part of the U.K. and there is a long history of Irish revolt to English rule. The first royal visit to Ireland had just taken place in 1821 by King George IV.

Against this backdrop of persecution and death it can be no surprise that Catholics would have developed a way to pass down their Faith. Since there are similarities between Catholicism and Anglicanism/Episcopalian, “Twelve Days of Christmas” would have passed below the radar.
