What do the Saints tell us or what advice do they give regarding the fast and abstinence of Lent?

"Let the mouth fast from foul words and unjust criticism for what good is it if we abstain from birds and fishes but bite and devour our brothers." ~ St. John Chrysostom

"Your fast would be rejected if you were immoderately severe toward your servant. Will it be approved if you fail to recognize your brother or sister? I am not asking what food you abstain from, but what you love. Do you love Justice? Well, let your love be seen!" ~ St. Augustine of Hippo

OUR LADY SPEAKS

Blessed Mother revealed to St. Elizabeth of Schoenau that as a child one day when reading at the Temple:

When I opened the book, the first thing I saw was this passage of Isaias: 'Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a son.' As I understood from this that the Son of God was going to choose a virgin to be His Mother, I immediately resolved in my heart, out of reverence for that virgin, to remain a virgin myself and to offer myself to her as a handmaid and always to serve her and never to leave her, even if I had to travel all over the world with her.

On the night (March 25th) the Archangel Gabriel appeared to Blessed Mother to tell her that God had selected her to be the Mother of the Savior, these are her own words of what transpired immediately before the Archangel appeared:

That night I prostrated myself devoutly in prayer, and with the most intense love I begged the Lord that He might deign to let me live long enough to see His Mother with my eyes, serve her with my hands, bow my head before her in reverence, and place myself completely at her service.

ASK FATHER

Father, when we mystically travel during the Consecration during Mass to the foot of the cross on Calvary, are we mystically present an equal number of times to the number of Masses we attend in life, or mystically present only once, but our age changes appropriately?

It is true that the Holy Mass is the Memorial of Christ's sacrifice at Calvary. But as a memorial

ceremony normally involves the remembrance of someone who is dead, the Mass is altogether unique because Jesus is alive – indeed He is Risen and Glorified! Jesus is the true Priest who celebrates each and every Mass! So, when you go to Mass you are going to a liturgical gathering to pray with Jesus and to join in with Jesus to offer to the Eternal Father Jesus' Infinite sacrifice which won our redemption. It is therefore an awesome privilege to attend Mass and to make this offering to the Father with our High Priest, Jesus, and to offer yourself to the Father in union with Jesus. In Holy Mass the sacrifice of Calvary is made present to us in a sacramental manner through the ongoing priestly ministry of Jesus Christ (see CCC 1362-1368).

Because Christ was a unique human being, the sacrifice he offered on the cross once and for all is a unique act. He was a human being, so it was an act that took place in history and is therefore past. He is God, who is outside of time and lives in the eternal present: past and future are always present to him. This means that the actions of Christ on Calvary and on Easter Sunday morning are eternal acts that can be made present again by the power of the Spirit.

This is what happens in the Eucharist. The power of Calvary—the sacrifice that takes away sins, heals, and transforms—becomes present and available to us. It can be applied to our need.

In every Mass, Jesus Christs descends upon the altar in the fullness of his body, blood, soul, and Divinity. He is truly present, giving himself to us completely in the Holy Eucharist. It is truly the sacrifice of Calvary made present once again. What a beautiful and profound reality! As St. Padre Pio once said, "If we only knew how God regards this Sacrifice, we would risk our lives to be present at a single Mass." Why would we miss Mass for anything?

BOOK REVIEWS

The Martyrs of La Florida: A Heroic Story of Catholic Faith by Corinna Laughlin Submitted by Katherine Owens

This 2019 graphic novel/biography was brought to my attention by one of our seniors as a book to add to the growing St. Augustine Fiction collection I've been trying to build at the Proctor Library the last few years. This book presents what biographical details (with names) are known of the Spanish and Indian martyrs of Florida in the 16th, 17th, and 18th centuries. Some of the martyrs were killed by various Indian tribes, while others were killed by the English of South Carolina. This book is part of the Canonization efforts for these men, women, and children that is currently underway.

As a topic of high regional interest of us here in the Diocese of St. Augustine, here is the website about the efforts: Martyrs of La Florida Missions - Tallahassee, FL.

FSSP MASSES AT THE SHRINE

On the weekend of January 15th, the FSSP conducted a 3-day pilgrimage in St. Augustine,

Florida led by Fr. Jonathan Romanoski, the pastor of Corpus Christi parish in Naples/Fort Myers. Fr. Romanoski offered a traditional Latin Mass at the Cathedral-Basilica of St. Augustine on Friday afternoon, and planned to offer mass at the rustic altar on Saturday and Sunday. Unfortunately, weather conditions forced the weekend masses to be relocated to the indoor chapel. At the Sunday mass Father gave an excellent sermon discussing the faith of the Spanish conquistadors and the hand of Divine Providence in settling the New World. He noted that Christopher Columbus reached land on the feast of Our Lady of the Pillar, certainly no coincidence, as that was the first Marian apparition evangelized Spain, and Spain evangelized the New World. Likewise, the patron saint of Aviles, the hometown of St. Augustine's founder Pedro Menendez was none other than St. Augustine, and Pedro made landfall in Florida on the feast of St. Augustine.

In recounting the courage of the Spanish missionaries, Father told of the arduous trek through the woods and swamps between St.

Augustine and Jacksonville when Pedro and his men defeated the Protestant Huguenots at Fort Caroline without suffering a single causality. Father concluded with a plea for us to let our traditional parishes and families remain our fortresses, but to go into the world fearlessly as the Conquistadors did and win souls for Christ and the Church.

CHURCH SYMBOLISM

"The Four Evangelists" Submitted by Katherine Owens

What is the importance of four symbols for the Evangelists who wrote the Gospels?


St. Matthew, the first of the Gospels is represented by a winged man.



St. Mark, the second of the Gospels is represented by a winged lion.



St. Luke, the third of the Gospels is represented by a winged ox.



And St. John, the last of the Gospels is represented by an eagle.



It was St. Irenaeus in the 2nd Century who reading passages in the Old and New Testament saw a relation between the foci of the four Gospels and the meaning of the four living creatures:

And in the midst thereof the likeness of four living creatures: and this was their appearance: there was the likeness of a man in them....And as for the likeness of their faces: there was the face of a man, and the face of a lion on the right side of all the four: and face of an ox, on the left side of all the four: and the face of an eagle over all the four. (Ezechiel 1:5, 10)

And in the sight of the throne was, as it were, a sea of glass like to crystal; and in the midst of the throne, and round about the throne, were four living creatures, full of eyes before and behind. And the first living creature was like a lion: and the second living creature like a calf: and the third living creature, having the face, as it were, of a man: and the fourth living creature was like an eagle flying. And the four living creatures had each of them six wings; and round about and within they are full of eyes. And they rested not day and night, saying: 'Holy, holy, holy, Lord God Almighty, who was, and who is, and who is to come. And when these living creatures gave glory, and honour, and benediction to Him that sitteth on the throne, who liveth for ever and ever; (Apocalypse 4:6-9)


St. Irenaeus wrote that the living creature with the face of a man represents a divine man and St. Matthew is the recorder of Jesus Christ's genealogy. The lion symbolizes royalty and leadership and St. Mark's Gospel focuses on Jesus's role as messenger and Son of God. The ox as a beast that is slaughtered for man's nourishment symbolizes sacrifice and St. Luke's gospel has several stories of sacrifice, sometimes including calves, and this foreshadows Jesus's priesthood. And the eagle flies over its dominions and keeps watch over all, and St. John's Gospel provides many examples of the teachings of Jesus and the close relationship He has with God the Father.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Pope St. Pius X (1835-1914) instituted the "Oath Against Modernism" that was required of all clergy, pastors, confessors, preachers, religious superiors, and professors from 1910 until 1967 when it was suppressed by Pope Paul VI. Here is an excerpt from the Oath:

Fourthly, I sincerely hold that the doctrine of faith was handed down to us from the apostles through the orthodox Fathers in exactly the same meaning and always in the same purport. Therefore, I entirely reject the heretical misrepresentation that dogmas evolve and change from one meaning to another different from the one which the Church held previously. I also condemn every error according to which, in place of the divine deposit which has been given to the spouse of Christ to be carefully guarded by her, there is put a philosophical figment or product of a human conscience that has gradually been developed by human effort and will continue to develop indefinitely.

Lord Jesus Christ, may the Oath found in our Sacred Tradition be resurrected, implemented, and believed in the Catholic Church again, Amen!
