Canonical Coronation of Our Lady of La Leche

The image of Our Lady of La Leche will receive an official Coronation on Sunday, October 10, 2021, at the Cathedral Basilica in St. Augustine. Our Lady is the fourth site in the United States with a statue that is officially crowned. As the Pope is not able to do the coronation himself, his appointed representative, Bishop Estevez, will be conducting the ceremony and celebrating the Mass. She will be enthroned on Monday, October 11, 2021 back at the Mission Grounds. The Bishop has called for a Spiritual Bouquet-Rosary Congress from September 24th to October 1st in advance of the coronation. There will be a Mass as part of the Rosary Congress each day at a different parish in the Diocese.

St. Patrick's has been selected as one of the parishes that will have a Rosary Congress. Fr. Liguori will also be keeping the church open for 24-hour adoration starting at 9a.m. on Tuesday, September 28th through 8a.m. Wednesday, September 29th. Each participating parish will have a different theme for the day. St. Patrick's designated day is Tuesday, September 28th and the theme is: "In thanksgiving for raising up Catholic priest sons who proclaim the Gospel of Life."

Bishop Estevez's Letter about Vaccines

Located on the Diocese's Facebook page, behind a login screen:

September 12, 2021

Dear Faithful,

I have heard from several pastors who have explained their experiences of helping families deal with the anguish and loss of loved ones from COVID – both those unvaccinated and those who were vaccinated.

I encourage everyone to get the COVID vaccination. As our Holy Father, who has received the vaccine himself, has said – it is an act of love – for those around us. It is truly a matter of concern for those who respect life.

Unfortunately, the matter of vaccinations has become a political issue. This should not be – we do not politicize other vaccines that protect us, especially our children, from diseases that can be thwarted. We should give praise to God that we have been able to find solutions to so many diseases – and we should avail ourselves to take advantage of this gift from God – a gift we asked for in all parishes to pray for once the pandemic first took root.

This is not a time for political partisanship – it is a time for all the faithful to step up in love for our own families – to step up for life – as Christ himself suggested in the Gospel – even the unknown stranger whom the Lord reminds us is our neighbor.

I echo Pope Francis in his exhortation that we pursue vaccinations. I encourage, whenever possible, our parishes to host opportunities to the faithful to be immunized.



BOOK REVIEWS



Chief Truths of the Faith by Fr. John Laux, M.A.
TAN books

During this time of confusion and darkness, when the stars of Heaven are dimmed, it's great to pick up a book like this and go back over the basics.

From the inside cover:

Fr. John Laux, M.A. was a high school religion teacher who distilled the fruit of his many years of research and teaching into these fine high school religion books. At first glance, it might appear foolish to reprint books that were first published in 1928. But a reading of Fr. Laux's books will lay that thought to rest. For he had a rare talent of capsulizing the intricacies of our Catholic Faith and its theology into succinct, precise, learned and yet lively prose that is at once truly interesting and that all can easily understand...

Foolish to reprint books from 1928? No, please, more of them! The older the better. And the comment about "capsulizing the intricacies of our Catholic Faith" is spot on. As a teacher myself, I've found that repetition of material really makes you home in on the essentials and polishes your presentation. Fr. John Laux does just this.

I have the entire series of his four books and it's well worth it to add these to your library.

ASK FATHER

Father, what are the most important books for every Catholic household to own?

Besides, of course, a good, Catholic translation of the Holy Bible (and, in fact, it's a beautiful tradition to get a large-style version that has pages in the front where you can record family names and sacraments that can be passed down!), families should look to have a good version of a Lives of the Saints (Butler is classic but there are so many), Imitation of Christ (Thomas à Kempis), True Devotion to Mary (St. Louis de Montfort), and perhaps a version of the Liturgy of the Hours (either the 4-volume in English or Latin, or the abridged Christian Prayer, or even the Traditional Latin Breviarium Romanum) that families might learn to pray together on some sort of regular basis.

Besides these, I'm a huge advocate of saints in their own words — the autobiographies of Saints Thérèse and Ignatius of Loyola, for instance, one of Saint Teresa of Àvila's works (like the Interior Castle), the "little catechism" of Saint Jean Vianney, perhaps the Diary of Saint Faustina, the writings and prayers of Saints Francis and Clare of Assisi... These are all such incredible sources of the applied theology and lived-out Tradition of the Church on an accessible and variegated level.

Additionally, the Catechism of the Catholic Church is good. The best is the Council of Trent Catechism, but I prefer the old St. Joseph Baltimore Catechism, especially for children.

<u>HISTORY OF THE FEAST OF CHRIST THE</u> KING

It has long been a common custom to give to Christ the metaphorical title of 'King,' because of the high degree of perfection whereby He excels all creatures (Quas Primas).

Hopefully someone with a better memory remembers which priest it was at immaculate Conception about five years ago who gave a sermon about Christ the King. The one point I remember was the pointing out that Christ needs to be King of nations, and if He is, there will be peace, etc., and that it is wrong for nations to not recognized Him as their legitimate and true head of government.

13. The foundation of this power and dignity of Our Lord is rightly indicated by Cyril of Alexandria. 'Christ,' he says, 'has dominion over all creatures, a dominion not seized by violence nor usurped, but His by essence and by nature.' His kingship is founded upon the ineffable hypostatic union. From this it follows not only that Christ is to be adored by angels and men, but that to Him as man[,] angels and men are subject, and must recognize His empire . . . (Quas Primas, including St. Cyril of Alexandria, In huc., x).

Inspired by the sermon, I asked a pious Protestant what she would think of having the U.S. dedicated to Christ the King and recognizing Him as the true head of government. Her answer was a resounding "No." The reason? Something to do with separation of church and state.

So, if Christ should be, but is not recognized as both head of church and government, what is the purpose of a Feast of Christ the King?

It turns out this is a relatively new feast, less than 100 years old! The liturgical color for this feast is white, and a Double of the First Class making it one of the most important feasts on the liturgical calendar.

...double feasts (so called because originally they had a double office.... The first place is given to the feasts of our Lord, the second to those of the Blessed Virgin Mary [emphasis original] (LeFebvre, Saint Andrews Daily Missal, "The Liturgical year & The Missal").

Pope Pius XI's Encyclical, Quas Primas established this feast on December 11, 1925. His purpose in establishing it was in order to create

a solemn affirmation of our Lord's kingship over every human society; He is King, not only of the soul and conscience, intelligence and will of all men, but also of families and cities, peoples and states and the whole universe (LeFebvre, Saint Andrews Daily Missal, 1635).

Because as Pope Pius XI wrote,

...[the] manifold evils in the world were due to the fact that the majority of men had thrust Jesus Christ and His holy law out of their lives; that these had no place either in private affairs or in politics: and we said further, that as long as individuals and states refused to submit to the rule of our Savior, there would be no really hopeful prospect of a lasting peace among nations (Quas Primas).

This lack of recognizing Christ as King "... is one of the great heresies of our time..." (LeFebvre, Saint Andrews Daily Missal, 1635). The Pope hoped that by having a yearly feast dedicated to Christ the King, this heresy would be effectively combatted, for if all men acknowledge "that Christ is King, society will at last receive the great blessings of real liberty, well-ordered discipline, peace and harmony" (Quas Primas).

Moved on the post-Vatican II calendar to the last Sunday of the liturgical year (November), the original position (last Sunday in October) was because it would be "the climax of our celebration of all Christ's mysteries and a kind of earthly anticipation of his everlasting reign" positioned about one week before the feast of All Saints (LeFebvre, Saint Andrews Daily Missal, 1635-1636).

In his Encyclical, Pope Pius XI explained why that year (1925) was the year to promulgate a stronger devotion to Christ as King.

5. Moreover, since this Jubilee Year marks the sixteenth centenary of the Council of Nicaea, We commanded that event to be celebrated, and We have done so in the Vatican basilica. There is a special reason for this in that the Nicene Synod defined and proposed for Catholic belief the dogma of the Consubstantiality of the Onlybegotten [sic] with the Father, and added to the Creed the words "of whose kingdom there shall be no end," thereby affirming the kingly dignity of Christ. 6. Since this Holy Year therefore has provided more than one opportunity to enhance the glory of the kingdom of Christ... by closing this Holy Year with the insertion into the Sacred Liturgy of a special feast of the Kingship of Our Lord Jesus Christ (emphasis original). 24. If We ordain that the whole Catholic world shall revere Christ as King, We shall minister to the need of the present day, and at the same time provide an excellent remedy for the plague which now infects society. We refer to the plague of anticlericalism [spirit and actions against Christ's Church 1, its errors and impious activities (Quas Primas).

If Pope Pius XI felt that the evils of his day were so great that a reaffirmation of Christ's Kingship was in order, how much more do we need to proclaim Jesus Christ King of Heaven and Earth today!

We further ordain that the dedication of mankind to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which Our predecessor of saintly memory, Pope Pius X, commanded to be renewed yearly, be made annually on that day (Quas Primas).

Grace be unto you and peace from him that is, and that was, and that is to come, and from the seven spirits which are before his throne, and from Jesus Christ, who is the faithful witness, the first begotten of the dead, and the prince of the kings of the earth, who hath loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood, and hath made us a kingdom, and priests to God and his Father, to him be glory and empire for ever and ever. Amen. Behold, he cometh with the clouds, and every eye shall see him, and they also that pierced him. And all the tribes of the earth shall bewail themselves because of him. Even so, Amen. I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end, saith the Lord God, who is, and who was, and who is to come the Almighty... And I turned to see the voice that spoke with me. And being turned, I saw seven golden candlesticks:

And in the midst of the seven golden candlesticks, one like to the Son of man, clothed with a garment down to the feet. and girt about the paps with a golden girdle. And his head and his hairs were white, as white wool, and as snow, and his eyes were as a flame of fire, and his feet like unto fine brass, as in a burning furnace. And his voice as the sound of many waters. And he had in his hand seven stars. And from his mouth came out a sharp two-edged sword: and his face was as the sun shineth in his power. And when I had seen him, I fell at his feet as dead. And he laid his right hand upon me saying: Fear not. I am the First and the Last, and alive, and was dead, and behold I am living for ever and ever, and have the keys of death and of hell...

St. Louis de Montfort at the end of True Devotion to Mary recommends starting the Rosary with this prayer:

I unite with all the saints in Heaven, with all the just on earth and with all the faithful here present. I unite with Thee, O my Jesus, in order to praise worthily Thy holy Mother and to praise Thee in her and through her. I renounce all the distractions I may have during this Rosary, which I wish to say with modesty, attention and devotion, just as if it were to be the last of my life.

We offer Thee, O most Holy Trinity, this Creed in honor of all the mysteries of our Faith; this Our Father and these three Haily Marys in honor of the unite of Thy Essence and the Trinity of Thy Persons. We ask of Thee a lively faith, a firm hope and an ardent charity. Amen.

On October 13, 1973, Our Lady of Akita told Sister Agnes Sasagawa,

As I told you, if men do not repent and better themselves, the Father will inflict a terrible punishment on all humanity. It will be a punishment greater than the deluge, such as one will never seen before. Fire will fall from the sky and will wipe out a great part of humanity, the good as well as the bad, sparing neither priests nor faithful. The survivors will find themselves so desolate that they will envy the dead. The only arms which will remain for you will be the Rosary and the Sign left by My Son. Each day recite the prayers of the Rosary. With the Rosary, pray for the Pope, the bishops and priests [emphasis added]. A Message From Our Lady - Akita, Japan **EWTN**

CHURCH SYMBOLISM

"The Cross, Part IV" Submitted by Katherine Owens

...sinners' roses only look like roses, while in point of fact they are cruel thorns which prick them during life by giving them pangs of conscience, at their death they pierce them with bitter regret and, still worse, in eternity, they turn to burning shafts of anger and despair. But if our roses have thorns, they are the thorns of Jesus Christ Who changes them into roses. If our roses prick us, it is only for a short time – and only in order to cure the illness of sin and to save our souls (Montfort, The Secret of the Rosary, 11).


The Rosary is a string of roses offered to Our Mother. We anchor each Rosary at the beginning and the end by using the Crucifix on the end to make the Sign of the Cross. Do you remember the question I asked at the beginning of this series back in July? (Do you see the Cross as a weapon?)

The Rosary is recognized as one of our greatest weapons against demons, and connected to it, we

have the emblem of our salvation – Christ's death on the cross, reminding us of the cost of our liberation from sin. In fact, when Our Lady appeared to St. Dominic in 1214, she said, "Dear Dominic, do you know which weapon the Blessed Trinity wants to use to reform the world?" (Montfort, The Secret of the Rosary, 18).

So important is the Rosary, according to St. Louis de Montfort, that while it was devotedly said for about 100 years after St. Dominic, a falling away from saying the Rosary is part of the reason God allowed the Black Death to descend on Europe in the mid-14th Century (*The Secret of the Rosary*, 22). In 1913, when Our Lady appeared at Fatima, first the three seers were visited by an angel who taught them to properly say the Rosary.

In two of her most venerated apparitions, Our Lady appeared carrying a Rosary:





In painting and statuary, Our Lady points us toward her Son in one of two usual ways, as Madonna and Child or by carrying her Rosary with a large Crucifix. But there are also the images of the Immaculate Heart of Mary where her heart is surrounded by roses (with or without sword), while in images of Our Lady of Sorrows, her heart is either pierced by a sword(s), or in rare cases, she holds a crown of thorns.

Two sword wielding saints are St. George and St. Michael the Archangel.

While brandishing his plastic sword and shield, my buddy, Leonard Walsh said last All Saints Day as his hint for which saint he dressed up as, "I killed the devil." It's only natural that St. Michael uses a sword for this task!

In fact, there is at least one documented instance of St. Michael wielding a sword in modern warfare, during the Korean War. If you are not familiar with this story, it is retold in various places online. One such location is <u>Saint Michael the Archangel Saves U.S. Combat Marine</u> - TFP Student Action.

The Cross was to the demons as a rampart that covered the just man, and allowed him to brave them; or like the sword, which through the angels gave them bloody wounds...

At the head of the heavenly legions was the Archangel Michael, chief of the heavenly armies of God, and the great conductor of just souls into eternity. He bore in one hand the sword of flame, and in the other the standard of Divine victories (Chardon, Memoirs of a Guardian Angel, 284, 293).
